## OUR PERFORMANCE IN 2016

In the 12 months to 30 September 2016, NZCT distributed \$40.9 million to sporting, local government and community groups nationwide. Many of these groups rely heavily on volunteers and have limited budgets. NZCT’s financial assistance is always gratefully received. It allows local clubs and organisations to run events or deliver services they wouldn’t otherwise be able to.


### RETURN TO THE POKIE PLAYERS

On average, 91.1 cents of every dollar waged at an NZCT venue is returned to the player.


### RETURN TO THE COMMUNITY

## WHAT SETS NZCT APART?

### Sport is our focus

NZCT plays a significant role within the New Zealand amateur sporting fraternity. At least 80 percent of the funds we distribute go towards amateur sport. And while amateur sport is our main focus, we are also a strong supporter of other worthy community activities, including local government projects and essential rescue services such as Life Flight.

### Local funding

NZCT has a policy of returning funds to the communities in which they were raised. Around 90 percent of our grants will benefit the community where the funds were raised. The remainder goes towards national organisations like Outward Bound or Special Olympics which provide widespread benefit to many communities throughout the country.

### Regional Advisory Committees

NZCT pioneered the development of Regional Advisory Committees (RACs) whose members advise us on the distribution of gaming funds in their communities. We have RACs representing nine different regions. Each committee is made up of highly respected leaders who bring local insight and knowledge to the grants decision-making process.

### Professional and ethical

NZCT sets the standard for professional and ethical performance. We consistently strive to exceed best practice. In 2006 we were the first gaming trust in Australasia to become AS/NZS ISO 9001:2000 accredited and we have been recertified every year since. We are the only trust to have its own internal audit committee.

### Experienced team

NZCT is fortunate to have a team of qualified, experienced staff who work hard to ensure the trust runs smoothly. From our highly regarded trustees, right through to our experienced in-house service technicians, we are all proud of the work we do and the positive impact we have on local communities.

### Harm minimisation measures

NZCT takes harm minimisation very seriously. To prevent and reduce the harm caused by gambling, NZCT:

- pays a Problem Gambling Levy to the Ministry of Health (\$1.5 million in 2016) to provide assistance programmes
- gives all our gaming venues a Harm Minimisation Manual which includes our Harm Prevention and Minimisation Policy, Exclusion Orders and a Harm Minimisation Incident Register
- trains all gaming venue staff to recognise and assist problem gamblers (during 2016 we provided over 500 venue staff training sessions)
- displays signs and distributes pamphlets which encourage problem gamblers to seek help.
