Publicans Reg and Sue are thrilled with their results. "We had a lot of tourists through during a very successful Lions tour, which gave us a lot of exposure," said Reg. "We knocked the pub over and completely rebuilt it two years ago and now I reckon we've got one of the best Irish pubs in the world."

And their fans seem to agree. From 25,000 online nominations, the pub emerged among the top eight in the Asia, Africa, Middle East and Pacific categories of Best Sports Experience and Best Entertainment Experience for the pub, and Best Bar Person for Reg's daughter, Hillary (pictured second from the left) who's 'grown up' at the venue.

The secret to their success is, according to Reg, not just understanding hospitality, but also understanding people. "We have the gaming side to the business, which all our staff have to be trained and skilled in on top of everything else. A lot of other Irish pubs we're competing against wouldn't have that."

Excellent attendance at HANZ mystery shopper training

We were very pleased to see over 200 NZCT venue staff attending the recent training run by Hospitality New Zealand on harm prevention and minimisation in readiness for the Department of Internal Affairs' (DIA) mystery shopper programme. Feedback from attendees and our field staff was positive and the content was a good refresher for everyone on the behaviour to look out for that may indicate someone has a gambling problem.

The DIA's rolling mystery shopper programme will assess how well gaming venues are meeting the requirement to demonstrate a duty of care towards their gaming patrons. Every gaming venue should expect to be visited by a mystery shopper at some point.

The aim of the training was to make sure all staff supervising a venue's gaming area are able to identify behaviour that may indicate gambling harm, confidently approach gamblers to check in with them, offer information and support for seeking help if the gambler needs it, and ensure all observations are recorded in the register that must be held at the venue.
